SHARON GREGSON

GET PASSIONATE ABOUT POLITICS: HOW TO PUSH FOR A SOLUTION TO BC'S CHILD CARE CRISIS Friday, May 3, 8:30 am to 9:45 am



re you planning to vote in the provincial election on May 14, 2013? Believe it or not this keynote address just might make you passionate about politics! Who we elect and the decisions that politicians make does impact our early care and learning work. Will the new BC government move forward to implement the \$10/Day Child Care Plan?

SHARON GREGSON believes that the time has come for BC to start building a child care system and that we all have a role to play to make that happen. She is passionate about the right of families to access affordable child care services, the right of children to high quality care, and the right of early childhood educators to be well-paid for the important and demanding work they do. Her advocacy started in 1987 as a mother with four young children of her own needing to access affordable, quality daycare for her own family, and then speaking out on behalf of all parents who desperately need a publicly funded child care system in this province and this country. Sharon speaks out regularly on the impact of public policy

on working families, on government inaction, and the needs of women and children. She is a spokeswoman for the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC and has represented BC on the boards of the Child Care Advocacy Association of Canada, the Child Care Human Resources Sector Council, and the Canadian Child Care Federation. She was twice elected as a trustee to the Vancouver Board of Education, and chair of their finance and legal committee. She worked to ensure early care and learning issues were a consideration within the Vancouver education system. Sharon also co-chaired the Vancouver Joint Child Care Council. Sharon travels the province sharing the \$10/Day Child Care Plan as

the solution to the child care crisis in BC and she's the director of Child and Family Development Services at Collingwood Neighbourhood House in East Vancouver. She also rides a 1983 Harley Davidson motorcycle, has a student pilot licence for powered parachutes, a scuba diving ticket, and is heavily tattooed!

arly learning and child care is an integral and critical reality of modern Canadian family life, yet the approaches that Canada—both nationally and provincially—has taken have yet to adequately address this reality. Don will present a poignant picture as to why Canada needs to do better with regard to our children, why early learning and child care is such a critical issue, and why now, more than ever, Canada's early childhood community needs to rally itself and work together for the sake of children, families, and our profession.



DON GIESBRECHT is president and CEO of the Canadian Child Care Federation. He has been the president of the CCCF since 2007 and added the title of CEO in March 2012. Prior to working at the CCCF, Don was the executive director of an infant, preschool, and school age child care program in Winnipeg. In 2006, he was appointed to the Minister of Human Resources and Skills Development Ministerial Advisory Committee on Child Care Spaces. He was also president of the Manitoba Child Care Association from 2002 to 2004. Don believes passionately in the necessity of a professional association for the ECE sector in Canada and that, collectively, Canada has to improve services, practices, and policies for children and families. Don is married (his wife is an executive director of a child care program), has two teenage children, and can be found coaching his son's hockey team in the winter and shuttling his daughter to her many dance classes (and despite what his kids think, he is cool and with it).



Provincial Election 2013: Where Does Early Care and Learning Fit In?

With BC's provincial election coming up shortly after conference, ECEBC, in response to members' requests, has organized an educational forum where representatives from the BC Conservative Party, BC Liberal Party, Green Party of BC, and the New Democratic Party of BC will speak on their party's platforms on early care and learning. You will have an opportunity to ask representatives questions or to submit written questions to ECEBC, which will be forwarded to party representatives for a response shortly after conference. B1 Making Music For Fun... Inspiration and Confidence

Come join Chris for an afternoon of music and fun. You will explore how you can use song, speech, simple rhythm instruments, movement, and visual aids to enrich your musical experiences with young children. If you lack confidence with how to use music with young children or if you simply need a little inspiration, this is the workshop for you.

CHRIS ROSKELLEY is an ECE with over 30 years of experience. For the past 17 years she has worked as a self-employed music teacher at UBC Child Care. Chris also teaches the music component in the ECE programs at both Vancouver Community College and Burnaby Continuing Education.

B2 Introduction to Creative Educational Dance

This participatory workshop provides a gentle introduction to the elements of dance and how dance can be incorporated into early childhood programs. By connecting dance with play, Lorraine will inspire you to "dance your way into knowing." Her approach to dance is not so much about the training of the body, but using dance as a way of understanding ourselves, others, and the world around us. Absolutely no dance experience required.

LORRAINE WHITE-WILKINSON has a BA from York University where her studies focused on dance and the child. She has additional teacher training from the University of Utah and is currently completing an MA in Arts Education at SFU. She has over 25 years' teaching experience in daycare centres, community centres, studios, and elementary schools.

B3 Leading Together: Co-Creating the Curriculum

This workshop focuses on empowering preschoolers by co-creating the curriculum. Working together, teacher and child can explore, learn, and discover the wonders around them. Kyle will offer practical suggestions throughout the workshop and there will be lots of time for discussion.

KYLE BEAULIV grew up in Australia where she received a Bachelor's in Education. She has lived in Canada for 20 years working with children in a variety of roles. She received her diploma in ECE from Langara in 2009. She is currently employed at UBC as a preschool teacher.

Singing together is a powerful way to connect, develop group cohesion, and build trust. She believes that singing together in harmony is our birthright, a vital source of health and vitality, both for individuals and groups. In her singing workshops throughout Canada, the US, and Ireland, Shivon has helped thousands reclaim their singing voices.

B5 How to Adapt Your Child Care Program to Meet the Needs of Children

Inclusion should be fun and simple, and this workshop will explore the ins and outs of inclusion through children's books, play, and a variety of inclusive activities. We will look at the reality of diversity, our expectations, precursors, and simple modifications you can make to your program, toys, environment, and daily activities.

B6 Social and Emotional Development in the Early Years

This presentation will focus on the core concepts of social and emotional development based on extensive research that investigated how the public thinks about infant mental health. B7 Making History Together: Developing Our Capacity as Co-Leaders in the Movement for Universal Child Care

ECEs can make history by working together to transform child care in BC and beyond. As professionals we work at the heart of community life, providing access to education and employment, advancing women's equality, and supporting children's development as powerful persons. We are the co-producers of children's culture, which forms the foundation of human culture. In this workshop we will explore specific examples of how social movements have transformed Canadian society, identifying lessons learned from past and present. We will explore how to apply these lessons to our work as champions of children's rights and advocates for universal child care for all BC families. We will also identify practical tools and ideas for how to be a more effective advocate and provide time for thoughtful reflection on what it means to be a co-leader in a movement for universal child care.

TOM KERTES is an ECE and social movement organizer working to build strong communities for everyone. He has been a policy advisor to Ontario's self-regulatory College of Early Childhood Educators, instructor of ECE at Seneca College in Toronto, community organizer with homeless day labourers in Baltimore, MD, and an ECE at UBC, where he currently works with toddlers and preschoolers at a split-age child care centre.

C1 Forest Kindergartens as an Important Early Childhood Education Model

The forest kindergarten early childhood education model is distinguished by total nature immersion, inquiry-based teaching style, and flow learning. The outdoor setting leads to this being a natural sciences program with young children learning through hands-on direct experience with their environment. Not only are these children wellversed in basic natural science principles, the teaching style leads to greater problem solving and advanced critical thinking skills while setting up a life-long love of science. This workshop will give practical advice about how to ensure the success of your nature immersion commitment in your program, including the three most important considerations: appropriate clothing, the importance of having the right teachers, and building a community of families. ERIN KENNY is an internationally recognized nature immersion specialist and forest kindergarten expert. Erin has a bachelor's degree in environmental education and a graduate degree in environmental law. She is the director, nature immersion specialist at Cedarsong Nature School in Washington.

C2 Technology in an ECE Centre: How Do We Jump On Board Without Drowning?

We work with children for whom technology is as much a part of their lives as the air they breathe; yet we are nervous about bringing it into our early childhood centres. In this workshop, we will discuss some of the dangers around children using technology in their early years, but we will also look at ways we can use technology to breathe new life into our ECE practice. There are plenty of ways we can use technology to connect with other ECEs and there are new and exciting professional development opportunities on the web. There are also ways we can use digital cameras, digital microscopes, projectors, recording devices, and the Internet in our centres and still keep the children in our care safe. Come dip a toe into the sea called technology and we promise you won't drown.

C4 Reflections


We will share our image of the child and open up a discussion about participants' image of the child. We will reflect and explore together how the image of the child guides and influences our daily experiences with children. DEE MCPHEE and BARBARA LEE are early childhood educators who have been working with the principles of Reggio Emilia since 1997 at Quadra Children's Centre on Ouadra Island.

C5 Stopping the Gossip

There are many reasons why gossip occurs in the workplace. This workshop will explain how gossip becomes a way of interacting and how ECEs can stop it. This session will offer practical examples and tools to support individual actions on preventing gossip and how to facilitate proactive communications. MARC LALONDE is a certified ECE with infant/toddler and special needs and has a BA in child and youth care. He has over 30 years of experience in the field, 20 with First Nations' communities. He has worked as a front-line ECE, manager/supervisor, and as an infant development consultant. He has published several articles in ECE and authored the Mentoring Manual for the Aboriginal Infant Development Programs of BC.

C6 The Election, and Then What for Child Care?

This workshop focuses on advocacy and the latest news on the \$10/Day Plan and what's happening from a "child care is a right" perspective. We'll look at what's happening provincially and the latest cross-Canada advocacy developments. With the provincial election upon us what can we do as individuals to stay connected and involved in advocacy and political action?

The COALITION OF CHILD CARE AD-VOCATES OF BC (CCCABC) is a grassroots organization of parents, child care providers, concerned citizens, unions, social justice activists, and community organizations working to move forward the \$10/Day Early Care and Learning Plan.

C7 The Child in the City Project: Valuing Children's Voices in Our Communities

Where there are cities, there are children. However, very little, if any, consideration is given to children in the planning of the places they live in. Yet children are learning everyday about life in the city, from the toy roadways in a daycare to their morning commute across town to a caregiver. Where is the child's voice in all this? As children interact with their urban environment everyday, they have their own unique perspective to offer. The Child in the City Project aimed to understand how children perceive the city they live in, showcase their capabilities, and further the inclusion of their voices in community planning processes. The project supported ECEs from local child care facilities in gathering children's voices through various methods, including digital imagery, artwork, mapping projects, and pedagogical narrations. The

outcomes of the Child in the City Project are tools to share with the broader community, both the viewpoint of children in our urban setting and their capacities to voice their thoughts and opinions. These tools offer a process of how to gather children's voices and provide a platform for advocating for children's participation in community planning processes. This interactive workshop will showcase both the process, outlining ways of engaging children's voices, and outcomes of the Child in the City Project, including videos, pedagogical narrations, and various art endeavours. This workshop will also look at the importance of connecting children with their neighbourhoods/communities and identify ways of listening, valuing, and building children's voices.

GILLIAN PETRINI has been an educator for over 10 years, working with a wide range of ages and abilities, from daycares to middle schools. She has worked on various community development projects and within community planning. This project has been an exciting opportunity to listen to and value children's voices while highlighting their need to be included in creating the places they live in, for now and the future.

C8 Sign Me a Story, Volume One

Stories are a fundamental part of a child's life. Spice things up by telling the story in sign. Children enjoy imitating and participating with these stories, and signing stories is an inclusive activity to do in any centre. It can help facilitate language development, plus it's fun! *KIM BROWN, BA, ECE special needs, has*

worked with children and families for over 25 years as a consultant, instructor, teacher, and facilitator.

D1 Ouch! That Hurts! Redirecting the Punch

Uncover the triggers behind children's anger and aggression. Teach them safe and acceptable ways to express and release their feelings that are not hurtful to others, property, or themselves. This workshop will look at how we can assist children to find their control switches, support the development of self-control, and problem solve and redirect their power in helpful, not hurtful ways. *TERESA BOUCHARD is an occupational therapist, wife, and mother of two boys. Through her courses and workshops parents,*

child care professionals, and teachers feel empowered and gain skills that help children develop the qualities, characteristics, and life skills they need to be successful at home, in child care, school, and beyond.

D2 Pedagogical Narration: Beginning the Dialogue

Pedagogical narration is recognized as an important tool for observation and critical reflection in the field of ECE in BC. But there are many uncertainties: What is it? How do we use it? Why is it important? And how do we fit it into an already

busy day? Danielle and Kim will share their experience of embedding pedagogical narrations into their own practice and discuss both the challenges and the new ways of knowing that emerge. Pedagogical narrations cannot be "learned" in a day, but through dialogue and examples participants will come to a better understanding of how this ongoing process of deeper listening and reflection can stimulate new and richer practices.

KIM ATKINSON and DANIELLE DAVIS have presented workshops to ECEs, students, kindergarten teachers, and administrators throughout the province in conjunction with the Images of Learning Project, an exhibit that highlights the work of ECEs and the competencies of children.

D3 Images and Perspectives: Young Children and Digital Photography

When children use cameras what do their images and words challenge us to consider? This presentation looks at the use of digital photography by 3- to 5-year-old children as a means of expressing their ideas regarding the outdoor environment. The research draws on questions from the BC Early Learning Framework, reflects on a child's right to be heard as outlined in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, and explores the use of photography as a tool for listening. PEG HASTED is an early childhood educator, an oral storyteller, and a sessional instructor in the Early Learning and Care program at Camosun College.

D4 Engaging Fathers in Early Childhood Education Programs

This session will begin with a brief presentation on current father involvement research focusing on tips and strategies to support fathers in becoming engaged with their young children's early learning. Participants will then be challenged to look through a father-friendly lens at their programs and centres to discuss such topics as creating a dad-friendly environment, supporting dads to connect and network with other dads, creating

opportunities for dads to volunteer in their child's ECE programs, and talking to fathers about their children. JOSEPH DUNN, MA, has been working in adult education and in early childhood community development for the past 10 years in BC through the Children First and Success by 6 provincial initiatives. Part of the Advisory Committee for the Early Years Community Development Institute, Joseph researches, presents, and advocates for issues surrounding the importance of supporting dads in being actively involved in the lives of their young children.

D5 How Nature Immersion Programs Benefit the ADHD and Autistic Child

Studies show that children who are diagnosed with ADHD and autism benefit immensely from extended outdoor time. Erin will report on the current research as well as give advice from her experience working with ADHD and autistic children in nature immersion classes and camps. All of the Cedarsong Nature School programs that Erin runs are ADHD and autism inclusive and Erin has worked with groups and one-on-one with these children.

ERIN KENNY is an internationally recognized nature immersion specialist and forest

kindergarten expert. Erin has a bachelor's degree in environmental education and a graduate degree in environmental law. She co-founded Cedarsong Nature School and developed the first US Forest Kindergarten based on the German waldkindergarten early childhood education model.

D6 Bluebird, Bluebird: Songs and Games for Young Children

Join Pam and Loretta for a hands-on workshop on learning and participating in action songs, movement activities, and singing games. Experience how music can be used to include all children and build community. By adapting songs you can break down barriers and involve all students, cultures, and abilities in a universal experience.

LORETTA JACKSON and PAM CARR both have many years' experience in preschool settings and are currently completing their second year in the M.Ed Arts in Education program at SFU. Using play-based, artistic learning in a multi-age setting is an ongoing passion for both of them.

D7 Supporting the Work of ECEs: The Roles of ECEBC and Government

Early childhood education and learning is unique in British Columbia. Come and

learn how the mandates of ECEBC and the provincial government, through the ECE Registry, Child Care Licensing, and Early Learning Initiatives, support your work as an early childhood educator. This presentation will outline the provincial legislative framework, programs and supports, the role of your professional organization (ECEBC), and how both ECEBC and the government collaborate to support your work. A question-andanswer period will follow. *ANNE WETHERILL is the director of Child*

ANNE WETHERILE is the director of Child Care Programs and Services in the Ministry of Children and Family Development. Her responsibilities include the Early Childhood Educator Registry, Child Care Operating Funding Program, Major and Minor Child Care Capital Funding Program, and the Child Care Resource and Referral Program. EMILY MLIECZKO is the

executive director of the Early Childhood Educators of BC.

D8 Self-Care for Early Childhood Educators and Professionals

This workshop looks at how to support early childhood educators in self-care. This workshop will give an overview of how the self-care

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journal was developed and the importance of self-care for early childhood educators. Participants will learn how to self-care professionally and personally and how to watch for red flags for "best practices" in working with children, families, and colleagues. All participants will be given a Self-Care Journal and will have the opportunity to write goals and set boundaries during the workshop.

NAZNIN DHANANI has been an early childhood educator since 1992 and has her certification in administration in early childhood services and family resource programs. Currently, Naznin is the ECE resource coordinator for ELSA Net and her role is to support ELSA and Settlement Child Care Workers who work with newcomer children and families in Canada.

skills they need to be successful at home, in child care, school, and beyond.

E2 Communicating From the Heart: Creating Authentically Engaged Learning Environments

When we communicate from the heart, we move from communicating to others to communicating with them. We listen fully and bring the best out of others. We ask questions that draw out people's feelings, dreams, and desires, and we create a safe place for others to share their authentic Self. In this fun and interactive playshop, you will learn practical communication and awareness skills that inspire creativity, authentic self-expression, and connection between you and your students, coworkers, and parents. VINCE GOWMON is the founder of Remembering to Play Events. He leads presentations and playshops on communication, leadership, creativity, play, and intuition for early childhood educators across Canada.

E3 Creating a Culture of Possibility in Early Years Settings

Each early childhood setting has its own culture, routines, and ways of being. Does the culture in your setting reflect the values you hold about children, families, and learning together? Join us as we

explore how we can create a culture that is responsive, welcoming, and full of possibilities. We will discuss how our centres can become places that nourish social relationships and thoughtful engagement by reflecting on our environments, schedules, philosophy, and assumptions. We want you to leave with practical ideas that both challenge and rejuvenate you. KIM ATKINSON and DANIELLE DAVIS have presented workshops to ECEs, students, kindergarten teachers, and administrators throughout the province in conjunction with the Images of Learning Project, an exhibit that highlights the work of ECEs and the competencies of children.

E4 Wool: Shapes and Forms

Experiences with unspun sheep's wool offer a wide range of creative possibilities for both children and adults. During this workshop, participants will be introduced to the process of wet felting and creative ways of incorporating this oldest technique in storytelling and other areas of early childhood curriculum. *ANA VOJNOVIC is an early childhood educator who also holds an infant/toddler and special needs diploma, and is currently completing her BA in ECE at Capilano University. She has a certificate in fine arts and is an innovative textile designer.*

E5 Sing and Sign with Me, Volume One

Come and have fun singing and signing a variety of children's songs. Singing and signing is an inclusive activity to do in any child care centre. It will help facilitate language development, plus it's fun! *KIM BROWN, BA, ECE, special needs, has worked with children and families for over 25 years as a consultant, instructor, teacher, and facilitator.*

E6 Teaching the Hurt Child: Preschool Implications for Understanding and Responding to Difficult Behaviours

This workshop will look at the impact of early trauma on subsequent brain development and learning. Participants will learn to identify and understand the function of trauma-related behaviours in preschoolers. With this new understanding caregivers will learn strategies that promote healing and change for hurt children in a child care setting. This workshop is presented in lecture style with opportunity for discussion of case presentations.

ANDREA CHATWIN, MA, CCC consultant, educator, and therapist, holds a master's degree in counselling psychology and has extensive experience as an early childhood clinician. She specializes in attachment and trauma, particularly focusing on children who have had caregiver losses and placement disruptions.

E7 Speaking to the Business Community

AS ECEs, we are often speaking to the converted—people who agree with our goals—but we struggle to convince others. This workshop will provide practical tools and references on how to frame our agenda into value statements that the business community can buy into. By focusing on framing issues into value statements most people can agree with, we can provide compelling discussions the general public will listen to and be influenced by.

MARC LALONDE is a certified ECE with infant/toddler and special needs and has a BA in child and youth care. He has over 30 years of experience in the field, 20 with First Nations' communities. He has worked as a front-line ECE, manager/supervisor, and as an infant development consultant. He has published several articles in ECE and authored the Mentoring Manual for the Aboriginal Infant Development Programs of BC.


