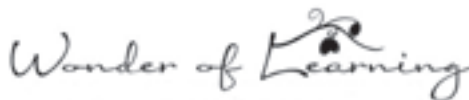

LIGHTEN UP! Humor is FUNdamental to Providing Early Care and Learning to Young Children

Friday, May 4, 8:30 am to 9:45 am

How does humor help you cope with the stress associated with teaching or caring for young children and help you the caregiver continue to provide quality early care and education day after day after day! This keynote will be entertaining and fun and guaranteed to get you laughing, but will also discuss substantive issues related to the early care and education of young children.

SUE DELANEY is a Child and Youth Advocate in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan where she coordinates local projects for children, youth, and their families. She works half of her time as a coordinator for The Kinsmen Activity Place of Saskatoon, working with gang-involved and street-entrenched

young people and coordinating activities for the new early years knowledge to action project called KidSKAN. In the other half of her work life, she is the part-time coordinator for the Child Care Advocacy Association of Canada (CCAAC). For the last 10 years Sue was the executive director of Communities for Children in Saskatoon and 10 years before that the executive director of the provincial Saskatchewan Early Childhood Association.

Sue has extensive experience in encouraging innovation and change in developing and delivering programs and services for children and families, and in collaborating with government, community, and academic groups to achieve change. Sue was named a Children's Champion

by Saskatoon Preschool Foundation in 2007 and awarded the Children's Advocate Champion award for Saskatoon in 2008. She has been a YWCA nominee for Women of the Year award and included as one of Who's Who of Canadian Women in Chatelaine magazine. Sue has been a board member of the National Child Care Advocacy Association of Canada and a council member on the Child Care Human Resource Sector Council. She is currently a board member of the National Alliance for Children and Youth. She is also a board member for the Saskatoon Core Neighbourhood Youth Co-op, but states that her most important role in the community is that of being a mom to Bryn and Jeffrey, a mother-in-law to Rylan, and a wife to Luc.

A1 The Importance of Natural Play

What kinds of environments foster genuinely spontaneous imagination? How do we as early childhood educators model key life skills: creativity, problem solving, and self-regulation? Join us to explore the open-endedness of an unencumbered learning pallet. Reawaken your intuition to teach through space and invitation and watch the children thrive. See why so many have joined in natural play and leave filled with ideas and inspiration galore.

A2 Exploring the Elements of Risk in Outdoor Play: Air, Water, Earth, and Fire

Two Vancouver Coastal Health licensing officers will present this exciting and thought-provoking workshop that explores the mysteries of the four elements: air, water, earth, and fire and ways to embrace outdoor play and all that our West Coast weather has to offer. A5/B5 Make it Meaningful! Literacy Development in a Reggio-Inspired Environment, Part 1

Kindergarten teachers will highlight how educators can support literacy development in a Reggio-inspired environment. While educators may often feel comfortable using the Reggio Emilia approach in the areas of science, art, and mathematics—when it comes to literacy, the pressure to use teacher-directed instruction and prescriptive programming persists. The presenters

will showcase project work led by students, talk about how literacy development was supported in meaningful ways, and share artful, playful, and a hands-on chance to engage in literacy opportunities.

PRESENTERS: *Laura Logaridis, Leslie Siegrist, and Katie Tranter are kindergarten teachers who work in a full school-day early learning program that is inspired by the Reggio Emilia approach to early childhood education.*

A7/B7 Remembering to Play: Inspiring Joy, Freedom, and Self-Care, Part 1

Remembering to Play is a fun and interactive playshop that will remind participants of the wisdom of a child's mindset and the importance of levity and joyful, authentic expression as cornerstones for education. Participants will explore the principle of "Yes and" as a means of creativity, how to engage and be receptive to others, the three levels of listening, and how to expand our creativity and capacity to see possibilities. The workshop will also explore principles of co-created learning and co-active communication, self-care and self-awareness, and new creative games for children.

PRESENTER: *Vince Gowmon is the founder of Remembering to Play Events, and is a certified professional life coach trained through the Coaching Training Institute and its Leadership Program.*

A8 Pay it Forward: The Role of Early Childhood Educators in Building a Canada that Works for All Generations

There is a generational crisis in Canada today. Parents with young children are spending more time in the labour market than any generation before them, yet average household incomes have flat-lined over the last 40 years. Meanwhile, housing prices across the country have nearly doubled and there are not enough quality, affordable child care services to help families balance

caring and earning. Well-trained, fairly paid early childhood educators are key to resolving this crisis. This workshop will explore the various ways that early childhood educators can help to build a Canada that works for all generations.

PRESENTER: *Lynelle Anderson is a certified general accountant and a senior researcher for UBC's Human Early Learning Partnership (HELP). She is a leading authority on family policy in Canada, especially with respect to the finances of child care services.*

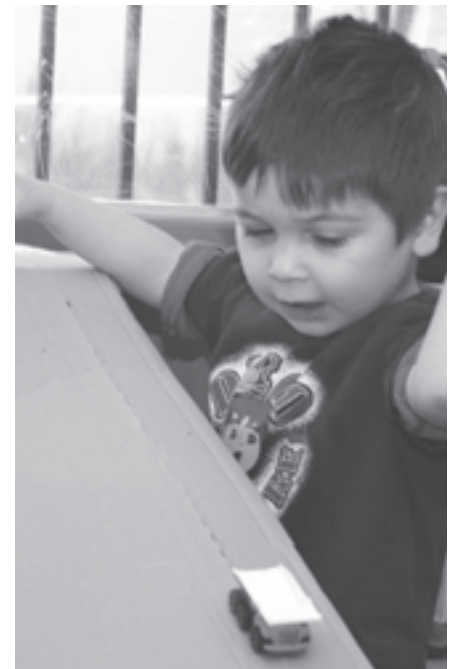

B1 Hmm, I Wonder What Would Happen If...

All children are natural risk takers and challenge seekers. The question to ask is: "Are we going to help them to manage risk and meet challenges positively, or are we going to introduce them to a society that is cautious, sanitized, and discouraging of risk taking?" This workshop/discussion will look at all aspects of the day and possibilities for encouraging risk, challenge, and exploration as it connects to children being competent, capable, and able in their own ways as they make and share their under-

standings of the world around them.

PRESENTER: *Patricia McClelland is an instructor at Northern Lights College and Northern BC Distance Education School. Linda McKinlay has been teaching early childhood education for 25 years and now works as a sessional instructor with Northern Lights College.*

B2 The Community Pedagogical Facilitators Project: Collaborative, Critically Reflective Dialogues

This presentation highlights different aspects of the Pedagogical Facilitators Project, which builds on the foundations of the

Investigating Quality and Early Learning Framework Implementation Project. This project, which is an initiative of the Unit for Early Years Research and Development at the University of Victoria, aims to create a community of practice by engaging practitioners in collaboratively and critically reflecting upon their knowledge, values, experiences, and practices, and exploring the meaning and practices in the field. This workshop will discuss the theoretical underpinnings and the implementation processes of the project.

B3 Effective Leadership

Participants will learn about the difference between managing and leading, which both have their uses. This lecture will focus on how leaders are surrounded by people who choose to follow them to greater achievements. Participants will learn how to facilitate, support, and empower staff to reach higher goals and create future leaders in their organizations.

PRESENTER: Marc Tatanasci Lalonde, BA, is an ECE with infant/toddler and special needs certification. He has over 30 years of experience in the field and is the manager of the Tsleil-Waututh Child and Family Development Centre.

B4 Following Children's Pathways of Play

If children play to learn, how do we follow? How do we feed their interests and support their discoveries, their wonder? In this workshop Natalie Lucas shares the pathways she has taken with children at

her centre that have led to making new discoveries in nature, learning about powerful issues of social justice and environmental dilemmas, and just plain having fun! The goal is to inspire you onto your own pathways of play.

PRESENTER: For the past 25 years, Natalie Lucas has been director and ECE at Wee Ones and Valhalla Children's Centre in the Slokan Valley. She was a participant in the ECEBC Leadership Project called Salmon Speaks.

C1 Forest Kindergartens: Outdoor Preschools as an Early Childhood Education Model

This workshop will provide participants with valuable tools for engaging young children in nature and using their sense of awe and wonderment to stimulate learning. Participants will learn specific tools for making the Forest Kindergarten a success, including proper clothing, teacher qualities, and working with parents. Participants will also learn the concept of flow learning that is a hallmark of Forest Kindergarten programs. The workshop will consist of a slideshow presentation and discussion. Erin recently returned from the international conference on early childhood and nature education and had an opportunity to observe Forest Kindergartens in the Netherlands and Germany, and will talk about the cultural differences that present unique challenges in each geographic location.

PRESENTERS: *Erin Kenny started the first Forest Kindergarten in the US based on the German waldkindergartens. She is passionate about connecting young children with nature through authentic immersion experiences.*

C2 An Introduction to Storyoga And Some of Its Playful Elements

During this interactive workshop presentation, participants will explore what

Storyoga is, the benefits for children, and Vanessa's top 10 Storyoga books. We'll explore the key elements of Storyoga, including fun floor poses, a child-friendly sun salutation, Storyoga songs, games and gross motor movements, relaxation and breathing techniques, and how to link stories to yoga. Please bring a yoga mat if you have one as the second half of the workshop has been designed for you to experience a mock Storyoga class.

PRESENTER: *Vanessa Braun is an early childhood educator and certified yoga instructor. She is also the founder and instructor of Storyoga, a program that fuses together children's literature with yoga.*

C3 We Had No Idea What We Were Getting Into: Our Ongoing Experience of the Investigating Quality Project

As participants of the Investigating Quality Project, we gathered monthly to engage in reflection and critical thinking with peers. We found ourselves talking about things we had never talked about before, topics that were difficult and controversial. We discussed play that happens in every setting but makes adults uncomfortable: bad guys, guns, death, gender, and racism. Why do we shy away from discussing these topics of children's play? What are our fears in supporting or questioning this play in the

centre and when we dialogue with parents? What are our assumptions about roles children take on in their play? How much do we control play, and why? We invite you to come and expand on the conversation with us.

PRESENTERS: *Kim Atkinson, Danielle Davis, Enid Elliot, Peg Hasted, Sarah Hilliard, and Jeanne Puritch are a group of educators who met during the Investigating Quality Project and continue to meet to discuss the ideas, dilemmas, and quandaries that are part of an early childhood practice.*

C4 Outdoor Play and Parachute Games

In this fun-filled workshop, participants will get new ideas and tips on outdoor play. We will be playing lots of traditional children's games suitable for the playground and explore how to use the play parachute!

PRESENTER: *Allan Hirsch is an educator of children and performing artist for over 30 years. He has presented workshops at ECEBC's annual conference since 1993!*

CS/DS Cultivating Intuition: The Heart of Healthy and Productive Decision Making, Part 1

Intuition is your greatest ally because it is the only resource that is unlimited, always accessible, and never wrong. It is with you

at all times, providing important information for your well-being and success. The question is: how often do you listen to it? In this playshop, you will participate in fun and interactive activities that explore intuition on three levels: awareness, space, and connection. How self-aware are you? What is your relationship with space? How open are you to connecting to your self and others? We will also explore practical applications for intuition, specifically how intuition can be cultivated and expressed with children. Walk away feeling inspired to make new and empowering decisions.

PRESENTER: Vince Gowmon is the founder of *Remembering to Play Events* and is a certified professional life coach trained through *The Coaching Training Institute* and its *Leadership Program*.

C6/D6/E6

The Big Picture—A Real Solution for BC's Children and Families

Join us on this daylong journey of why and how to solve the child care crisis in our province. BC advocates and their partners are moving forward in several significant and foundational ways, and this 3-part workshop will explore the work being done.

Part 1: Living Wages, Child Poverty, and Childhood Development

Part 1 will provide information on what a living wage is, how income relates to child poverty and early childhood development, and how the call for living wages policies relates to the call for an integrated child care plan for BC. Participants will gain a better understanding of social determinants of children's health and how an integrated child care plan for BC can benefit everyone.

PRESENTER: Michael McCarthy Flynn, MA, is a *Living Wage for Families* campaign organizer, who has worked on anti-poverty issues in Ireland, Africa, and BC.

NOTE: This is a 3-part workshop. Participants must register for C6, D6, and E6.

C7/D7 Beyond Head and Shoulders: Integrating Diversity Concepts into Circle Time, Part 1

Experiences in the early years are critical for establishing a sense of self and understanding of the diversity of our communities. Educators in child care programs are committed to going beyond the "head and shoulders" notion of circle time to offer programming that fosters appreciation of diversity and provides life lessons that enhance the child's view of the world. Through interactive circle times that address diversity themes, we can promote

children's positive self-esteem and healthy cultural identity. This workshop will explore the basic tenets of diversity education for young children, the sticking points that keep us from moving forward with this important aspect of early childhood education, and how to integrate diversity concepts into our programs.

PRESENTERS: Gyda Chud has over 30 years experience in the child care field and continues to participate in a number of child care organizations at the local, provincial, and national levels. Nora Mejia is a diversity trainer for Westcoast Child Care Resource Centre.

NOTE: This is a 2-part workshop. Participants must register for both C7 and D7.

C8 Children's Rights: The Right Thing to Do!

This workshop provides an overview of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and a report on the Children's Charter process in Vernon and Revelstoke. We will also explore activities to ensure that children's voices are heard as active citizens in their communities.

D1 Teaching the Hurt Child: Implications for Preschool Learning and Play

New research on brain development offers important information about how early trauma (children ages 0 to 3) affects brain development and impacts later development in cognition, social/emotional competence, and stress tolerance. Participants will learn more about interventions and how they must be specific, targeted, and steeped in understanding of how to shift early learning.

PRESENTER: *Andrea Chatwin, MA, CCC, is an early childhood therapist and educator with extensive experience in the areas of attachment, trauma, and early brain development.*

D2/E2 Understanding and Dealing with Challenging Behaviours, Part 1

All children have a desire to belong and feel important. In an attempt to get their needs met they can act in negative ways. Learn to identify the underlying needs and four mistaken goals of children and help redirect them in ways that embrace involvement, empowerment, fairness, and capability.

PRESENTER: *Teresa Bouchard is an occupational therapist, wife, and mother of two young boys.*

E6 The Big Picture—A Real Solution for BC's Children and Families, Part 3 The Early Care and Learning Solution: Moving It Forward

The Community Plan for a Public System of Integrated Early Care and Learning (known as the Plan) was released in April 2011, and it is increasingly seen as a solution to BC's child care crisis. As support grows, key elements of the Plan are receiving

more thought and discussion. During this workshop, participants will learn about the Plan's evolution and explore key elements of the Plan such as the proposed new educational standard for ECEs and how best to sustain community interest in the Plan leading up to the 2013 provincial election.

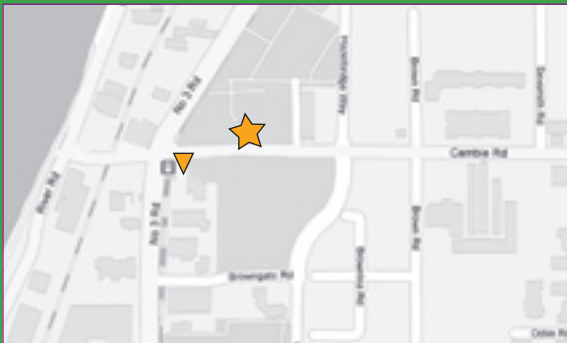
