LET'S TALK ABOUT TOUCHING TEACHER TRAINING

Thursday, May 12, 8:00 am to 6:00 pm and Friday, May 13, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm Radisson Hotel Vancouver Airport

Let's Talk About Touching (LTAT) is an outstanding training program designed to prevent child sexual abuse. Developed in BC for children aged 4 to 6 years, it has been a valuable resource for ECEs and kindergarten teachers since 1986.

This Teacher Training, which totals 14.5 hours, prepares licenced ECEs to present the LTAT program to children in early childhood centres. The program is broken down into 4 modules offered over Thursday and Friday. Module 1 provides an overview of the LTAT program and child abuse. Module 2 focuses on the BC Child, Family, and Community Service Act (the legal responsibilities) for when a child discloses abuse and how to make a report. Modules 3 and 4 focus on the Let's Talk About Touching program and kit and how to deliver the LTAT program to children in your centre. Each LTAT kit includes a program manual with 9 lessons and family resource materials in 7 different languages, teaching pictures, felt board figures, sorting cards, puppets, teaching dolls, and a CD of songs recommended in the lessons.

Note: You must be a qualified ECE or elementary school teacher to register. Participants must attend all sessions on Thursday and Friday. If you register for LTAT, you will not be able to register for conference sessions on Friday. You can register for Saturday conference sessions for the 1-day registration rates.

Presenters: Lisa McArthur is with UBC Child Care Services. Mary Peirce-Biagi is a long-time ECE who has been involved in LTAT since the 1980s.

FRIDAY MORNING KEYNOTE ADDRESS

RITA CHUDNOVSKY CHANGING LEADERSHIP...LEADS TO CHANGE

FRIDAY, MAY 13, 8:30 AM TO 9:45 AM

Does being a leader feel like something only other people can do? Well think again. In this keynote, Rita Chudnovsky will share a vision of leadership that is rooted in the values, strengths, and gifts of early childhood educators. Drawing on her experiences with ECEBC's Leadership Initiative, she will show how ECEs can take a strong and confident message about their value and worth out the door of their programs to the broader community. She will link this ECE culture of leadership to the Plan for an Integrated System of Early Care and Learning that ECEBC developed in partnership with the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC. This Plan offers early childhood educators a proactive way to use their voices and wisdom to influence change. Participants will have a chance to see where they fit in the Plan and how moving the Plan forward requires all of us to be leaders who are confident in the values of our field, confident in our contribution to the world, and confident in our ability to change it.

RITA CHUDNOVSKY has been an active member of Canada's early care and learning community for over 30 years. From 1989 to 1992, she was the first Children's Advocate for the City of Vancouver. She then went on to serve a four-year term on the Vancouver City Planning Commission, a citizen body that advises city council on long term issues affecting the City. From 1996 to 2000, Rita sat on the BC Child Care Council, a legislated advisory body to the minister responsible for child care services. Rita has also served as the BC Director to the Board of the Child Care Advocacy Association of Canada and chaired that organization's first Council of Advocates. In 2002, she received the Family Services Canada/Family Services Association of Toronto "Rosemarie Popham Award for Family Advocacy." In 2006, she received the ECEBC's Gayle Davies Award for Excellence in Early Childhood Education and Care. Ms. Chudnovsky received her Master of Education in 1984. She is retired from the Faculty of Child, Family and Community Studies at Douglas College and currently facilitates the ECEBC Leadership Initiative and staffs the "Moving to a System of Integrated Early Care and Learning in BC" project for the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC and ECEBC.



A SESSIONS, FRIDAY, 10:15 AM TO 12:15 PM

A1 » Making Sense of Brain Research

This workshop puts what ECEs already know about children's learning (the importance of paying attention to the whole child, attending to children's emotional needs, and the importance of providing children with meaningful and relevant ways to make sense of the world) into the language of scientists and educational researchers, so that we can better understand and explain our practices to families and policy makers. The workshop looks at the latest research in the cognitive sciences, and also dispels common myths about children and their brains.

Presenter: Tom Kertes, ECE with Infant/Toddler certification, B.A., returned to the centre-floor after working as a professor of ECE at Seneca College and as the policy advisor at Ontario's self-regulatory College of Early Childhood Educators.

A2 » Look at Me... I'm Learning Everyday: Using Pedagogical Narrations to Foster Social-Emotional Development in Young Children

Laura, Margaret, and Cindy will use pedagogical narrations or learning stories of adults and children involved in everyday experiences to discuss the importance of social-emotional development. Strategies to promote development related to attachment, communication, and play will be shared. Participants will have the opportunity to create a pedagogical narration as a way to communicate learning to families.

Presenters: Laura Doan, M.Ed., Margaret H. Patten, M.A., Cindy Piwowar, M.A., Ed., are faculty members in the Early Childhood Education Diploma Program at Thompson Rivers University in Kamloops, BC. They have recently written a book on the subject of supporting children's social-emotional development.

A3 » Next Leaders: A Showcase of the 2010/2011 ECEBC Leadership Initiative

The 2010/2011 Leadership Initiative participants will highlight their projects. This workshop will inspire and motivate ECEs province wide to be leaders in their own communities and help make the early care and learning sector visible. This is an opportunity for interested early childhood educators to learn about ECEBC's future Leadership Institutes.

Presenters: This workshop will be presented by participants of the 2010/2011 Leadership Initiative.

A4 » Outdoor Adventuring and Curriculum Too!

Not too long ago, terms like "nature deficit disorder" and "biophobia" were unheard of—not so today. Statistics show us today's children spend much less time outdoors and are these phobias and disorders the result? Where do educators fit into this scenario? Where can we start? Valhalla Trails Outdoor Adventuring program takes children out into the forest, neighbourhood, and back yard. In this workshop, Natalie will guide you through these environments and share some of the endless possibilities of learning in all curriculum areas that can take place outside the four walls. Using stories, documentations, and discussions, Natalie will focus on how educators can nurture nature connections and support learning moments in their own outdoor environments.

Presenter: Natalie Lucas is director and ECE facilitator of Valhalla Trails Outdoor Adventuring at Wee Ones and Valhalla Children's Centre in the Slocan Valley.

A5/B5 » Remembering to Play: Inspiring Creativity, Engagement, and Self-Care, Part 1

Remembering to Play is a fun, interactive, and experiential playshop that supports early childhood educators to remember the wisdom of a child's mindset and the importance of levity and joyful authentic expression as cornerstones for educating and healthy, productive living. Benefits include: exploring the principle of "Yes And" as a means of creatively engaging and being receptive to others; exploring three levels of listening, balancing roles, and emotional functions; expanding creativity and one's capacity to see possibilities; illuminating limiting beliefs and assumptions; understanding play as a means of self-care and self-awareness; learning new creative games for children, and much more!

Presenter: Vince Gowmon is the founder of Remembering to Play Events and is a certified professional life coach.

A6/B6 » Rhythmic Art! World Music and Culture through Rhythm, Percussion, and Song, Part 1

Through a progression of rhythm, drumming, and vocal and body percussion, participants will experience and celebrate world culture. The workshop will be facilitated with a collection of world percussion instruments and hand drums! We will travel the journey of rhythms as a collective, with affirmations of peace, harmony, freedom and understanding. Expect a high-energy engaging interactive experience!

Presenter: Angela Roy is the founder of Expression. She designed the rhythmic art program based on her extensive experience as a performing artist and educator. Angela recently released her "Unity Child World Music" CD.

A7 » Moving to a System of Integrated Early Care and Learning in BC

The Coalition of Child Care Advocates and ECEBC have developed a proactive response to BC's implementation of full-school-day kindergarten for five-year-olds and the consideration of pre-kindergarten for three- and four-year-olds. This workshop is for everyone who believes it is possible to develop programs for children that incorporate both care and early learning as well as meet the needs of working families. An in-depth look of our Plan will be presented with lots of time for full discussion.

Presenters: Members of the Advisory Committee for Moving to a System of Integrated Early Care and Learning in BC.

B SESSIONS, FRIDAY, 2:00 PM TO 4:00 PM

B1 » Who Cares?

HELP's research has led to policy recommendations to support families with time and resources to care for their young children personally, and community services such as early care and learning to help them balance their caring and earning responsibilities. How would these recommendations impact children, families, communities, and the economy? Participants will be introduced to family policy models that facilitate a discussion of "who cares" for and about young children in BC.

Presenter: Lynell Anderson is a certified general accountant with 30 years of financial consulting, volunteer, and research experience. She has worked with various levels of government as well as children, women, family, and youth-serving organizations and advocacy groups.

B2 » Child Care: It's My Right

The child care movement began as a central issue of the women's rights movement so it's natural that we would return to our roots and begin to explore child care from the position of women's, children's, and family's rights. This workshop will explore Canada's international treaty obligations to women, children, and families as they pertain to child care. Treaties such as the Convention on the Rights of the Child and the Convention to Elimintate Discrimination Against Women will be examined.

Presenter: Susan Harney is the chairperson of the Coalition of Child Care Advocates of BC, a non-profit advocacy organization working for a community based, high quality, affordable, accessible, publicly funded, and accountable child care system.

B3 » Images of Learning Project: Making Visible the Competencies of Children and Work of Early Childhood Educators

The Images of Learning Project, which has been exhibited across the province, is an exhibit that incorporates a strong visual and philosophical message that reflects the work of ECEs, as well as an image of the child as competent, complex, and full of potential. In this workshop participants will reflect on how they view children and discuss cultural and historical perspectives and how these perspectives frame our practice with children. Participants will have a chance to discuss the rules we have in our centres, what our values about children are, and what barriers exist that make it difficult to bring our values to our practice. Kim and Danielle will facilitate dialogue that both challenges and inspires participants to take a fresh perspective on the important work we all do.

Presenters: Kim Atkinson is a an ECE, workshop presenter, and writer who has 27 years of experience in the field of early childhood education. Danielle Davis has been in the field of early childhood education for 14 years. Her roles vary from that of ECE, to administrator, to workshop facilitator.

B4 » Kids Have Stress Too!

Stress can affect children in negative ways. It can interfere with their health, their ability to learn, and their socializing efforts with other children and adults. This workshop is designed to introduce participants to the Kids Have Stress Too! program. This workshop will increase your awareness and knowledge of how stress affects children and how it impacts children's physical, mental, and emotional coping abilities. This workshop will also outline concrete strategies to help children (and their parents) reduce and effectively manage some of the stress in their lives.

Presenter: Cindy Andrew, a former educator and health promotion specialist for over 20 years, has worked in a variety of roles dedicated to children's health.

B5 » Remembering to Play: Inspiring Creativity, Engagement, and Self-Care, Part 2

B6 » Rhythmic Art! World Music and Culture through Rhythm, Percussion, and Song, Part 2

C SESSIONS, SATURDAY, 8:30 AM TO 10:00 AM

C1 » Kindergarten Readiness Fact or Fiction

Full-school-day kindergarten will be implemented in all BC schools in September 2011. In this workshop participants will explore specific activities to facilitate the transition to kindergarten for children and families. Participants will have an opportunity to share their experiences supporting children in this transition. Feedback from teachers regarding their thoughts on school readiness and full-school-day kindergarten will be shared.

Presenters: Colleen Friendship and Charlene Gray are ECEs working in the Comox Valley. They are part of the Early Years Transition Team, which has been working with School District 71 in supporting children as they make the transition to kindergarten.

C2 » Child Care 101

This workshop will outline the current state of child care in BC and Canada. Participants will be provided with information that can be used to advocate and educate within their own communities for the early care and learning sector.

Presenters: Caroline Kent, Crystal Janes, and Stephanie Smith have a combined 60+ years of ECE experience and are all board members of CCCABC.

C3 » Exploring Children's Understanding of the Olympics

This workshop will share how two preschool centres in different communities explored the impact of the Olympics with the children. Participants will be asked to reflect on the similarities and differences in the two projects and the consequences for curriculum planning.

Presenters: Bev Superle and Linda Murdoch are both experienced early childhood educators who have been influenced by the Reggio Approach to create curriculum responsive to children's interests and needs.

C4 » A United Voice for Child Care

This workshop will present a brief history of the work that the British Columbia Government and Service Employees' Union has been working on in partnership with advocates, families, early childhood educators, and other child care providers to advance the creation of a publicly funded, quality child care system for BC's children. We will explore how you too can be a part of this movement and where you think we need to go for our next steps.

Presenter: Ursula Clark is a licensed ECE, Infant and Toddler, and Special Needs educator, is a member of the BCGEU, and is currently working as an organizer for the Union.

C5 » One Small Program: One HUGE Impact

Friday's Child, a strengths-based FASD (fetal alcohol spectrum disorder) program, is now in its eighth year. This workshop will describe the program, look at the role of staff, and consider the benefits of implementing the program within an early learning environment as a newly established program, or into existing programs. Although the focus is FASD, the easily adaptable techniques have proven successful with children who demonstrate behavioural challenges requiring specific supports although they do not have a diagnosis of FASD. Handouts and material will be available and there will be time for questions and answers.

Presenters: Terry Louden is an early childhood educator and works at the Aboriginal Headstart. Terry developed FASD strengths-based program for children birth to 6 years old, and families. Susan Urdec is a grandparent of 4 children living with FASD.

C6/D6/E6 » Cultivating Intuition: The Heart of Effective Decision Making, Part 1

Intuition is your greatest ally because it is the only resource that is unlimited, always accessible, and never wrong. It is with you at all times, always providing you with important information. The question is, how often do you listen to it? In this workshop participants will use fun and interactive activities to explore the depths of intuition and its practical applicability to everyday decision making. They will walk away with tools for connecting to their intuition and feel inspired to make new, empowering decisions.

Presenter: Vince Gowmon is the founder of Remembering to Play Events, and is a certified professional life coach.

Note: This is a 3-part workshop. Participants must register for C6, D6, and E6.



C7/D7/E7 » Active Start

The Canadian Sport (and physical activity) for Life model is an approach that provincial/territorial and national sport organizations and agencies are taking to build life-long enjoyment and involvement in sport and physical activity. Active Start stage is the first of seven stages of Canadian Sport for Life, which focuses on children from ages o-6. It encourages physical literacy, which gives children the tools they need to take part in physical activity and sport, both for healthy life-long enjoyment and sporting success by developing fundamental movement skills and linking them together into play. Learn how to integrate physical literacy principles and approaches into your ECE program, including:

- How to make physical activity fun and part of daily fitness and movement skills development.
- Proper movement skills such as running, jumping, wheeling, twisting, kicking, throwing, and catching.
- Exploring risks and limits in safe environments.

Training materials will be provided to participants to train others on how to apply physical literacy principles and approaches with children.

Presenter: Colin Higgs, Ph.D., is a member of the Canadian Sport for Life Expert Group. He is a professor in the School of Human Kinetics at Memorial University of Newfoundland, and has done extensive field work in developing countries and has published and presented widely on sport development and social development through sport.

Note: This is a 3-part workshop. Participants must register for C7, D7, and E7.

D1 » Emergent Curriculum

This workshop will focus on the theory, application, and examples of emergent curriculum. This will help educators to explore various ways to promote the creativity in young children and implement a child-centred curriculum. Learn the importance of relationships with materials and how to promote investigation in the classroom.

Presenter: Pooja Kalsi, M.Ed., is currently working as a program manager with Options Surrey Community Services and as an ECE instructor at Surrey College.

D2 » Embracing Individuality and Uniqueness: A Look at Temperaments and How to Bring Out the Best in Yourself and Your Children

Join Teresa Bouchard for this interactive workshop where parents and care-providers will explore temperament and the effects it has on how children (and you) respond to the world. By being aware of temperamental differences you will be better able to respond to children with techniques that guide their behaviours positively and learn how to appreciate and accept them as they are. You will leave with practical strategies that help children (and yourself) reach their full potential.

Presenter: Teresa Bouchard is an occupational therapist, wife, and mother of two young boys.

D3 » Circle Time Tool Box

This workshop covers almost every possible activity that can be done at circle time. We will explore the essential tools of a teacher of young children. Music, movement, puppets, storytelling, play, rhymes, poetry, and more.

Presenter: Allan Hirsch has 30 years of teaching and performing experience, which have given him a unique insight into activities for young children.

D4 » Sing and Sign with Me, Volume 1

Come and have fun singing and signing a variety of childrens' songs. Singing and signing is an inclusive activity to do in any child care centre. It will help facilitate language development, plus, it's fun!
