In her first five years as an early childhood educator, Dawn struggled to figure out where she fit in, who could mentor her, and how her profession really worked. She constantly questioned what she was saying as she felt she did not have the experience to back her up. She felt alone, and this isolation was draining her passion for early childhood education.

As a member of the fifth Leadership Initiative cohort, Dawn was encouraged to take a year to explore her own philosophy and substitute at centres around her community. This exploration was part of the plan to

help Dawn develop her core beliefs and values. Through this, she has been able to share her knowledge and passion with others, ask questions, and continue to develop her own philosophy through experiences with staff and families. As a Leadership Initiative participant, she was part of a team that helped each other self-reflect and question their practice. Working together, the group problem-solves, builds confidence and stronger messages.

With a stronger sense of her core beliefs and values, Dawn finds she is able to confidently talk with parents, something she used to find very intimidating. Dawn now recognizes that there is power behind her words and that people respect that. Through her new selfawareness and confidence, she is now able to stand up for what she believes in for her profession, the families she works with, and her own family.

Dawn feels grateful for the opportunity to be a part of the ECEBC Leadership Initiative and hopes to inspire other Early Childhood Educators to self-reflect and stay true to their values. She looks forward to staying connected and seeing what else her new skills, experiences, and partnerships will bring.
