Pathways of Truth with Cathy Balatti



Cathy Balatti, a member of the Haisla Nation is an uninvited guest residing on the unceded, unsurrendered lands of the Tk'emlúps te Secwépemc. She is an Indigenous early years professional with over three decades of experience, who is working toward a Bachelor of Child and Youth Care.

In Canada, we are all too familiar with the word reconciliation and what it hopes to achieve. However, much like the relationship it seeks to restore, some are skeptical of the notion of reconciliation. If reconciliation is working to repair a good relationship, we must first consider if there was ever a good relationship between First Nations Peoples and Canada.

Informed by her own unreconciled pathways, Cathy will share the journey of reclaiming her identity, and invites early years professionals to step into the discomfort of the truth in order to develop a deeper understanding of our shared history.

There will be opportunity for table discussions, small group work, and a question and answer period during the keynote address.

Canada's Early Learning and Child Care Workforce and The Canada-wide Plan

with Don Giesbrecht

On April 19, 2021 Canada entered a new era for Early Learning and Child Care (ELCC) with the announcement of the Canada-wide child care plan. Canada's ELCC workforce is central to the success of the plan, so what is happening across Canada specific to the workforce? What do the provincial and territorial agreements have to say about the workforce and what has actually been happening across Canada.

Don Giesbrecht is the Chair of the federal government's National Advisory Council on Early Learning and Child Care (ELCC), having taken a leave as CEO of the Canadian Child Care Federation (CCCCF).



Don has worked in Canada's ELCC sector for over 32 years, starting his career as an Early Childhood Educator in Winnipeg and most recently as CEO of the Canadian Child Care Federation (CCCCF). He believes that the transformational change that the Canada-wide child care plan will bring for Canada's children, families and ELCC sector can address the interconnected issues of affordability and accessibility of child care services for families along with enhancing quality for children together with a specific focus and importance of Canada's ELCC workforce.

He has previously chaired the CCCC, Manitoba Child Care Association the Alberta Resource Centre for Quality Enhancement, was a member of the federal government's Expert Panel on ELCC, sat on the executive committee of the Child Care Human Resource Sector Council along with serving on other committees and advisory roles in Canada's ELCC sector.



Early Care and Learning Workforce Recruitment & Retention with Dr. Reuben Ford

In fall 2018, the Province of B.C. launched its Early Care and Learning Recruitment and Retention Strategy (ECL R&R Strategy): part of a larger 10-year plan to increase the quality, affordability, and availability of childcare spaces in B.C. ECEBC is leading the sector-led evaluation of the ECL R&R Strategy. The project is learning: whether there is less turnover in the skilled Early Care and Learning workforce; whether the numbers of certified Early Childhood Educators are better able to meet demand; whether careers in Early Care and Learning become more popular; and whether public confidence in the Early Care and Learning workforce is increasing. These outcomes are generally being tracked as trends by undertaking cross-sectional surveys of providers of early care and learning and their employees; creating and maintenance a database of providers; public opinion surveys; visits to centres combined with key informant interviews; analysis of micro-data from Statistics Canada; and compilation and analysis of administrative data. Annually, SRDC has been collecting, analyzing, and reporting on these measures to determine whether the ECL R&R Strategy is on track to achieving its long-term goals and expected outcomes. The work will continue at least until 2024. The evaluation methods and tools are guided by a 25-member Sector Steering Committee - representing the diversity of the ECL field in BC. Funding and approvals of the project deliverables are provided by the Ministry of Advanced Education, Skills and Training.

In this presentation, Dr. Ford will share findings so far from evidence gathered for the evaluation since 2019.



Reuben Ford is a research director in SRDC's Vancouver office with extensive experience in the design and analysis of innovations spanning education and employment transitions. He is a Credentialed Evaluator with 30 consecutive years in program evaluation. Since 2003, he has worked with educators and thousands of students in four provinces on six large-scale investigations of early interventions to increase access to post-secondary education as well as analyses of the roles career education and student financial assistance play in the decision-making of potential learners. Before joining SRDC in 1998, Dr. Ford spent five years at the UK non-profit Policy Studies Institute, where he worked on several studies of child care. He holds a PhD in Geography from University College London.

SRDC is a non-profit research organization, created specifically to develop, field test, and rigorously evaluate new programs. SRDC's two-part mission is to help policy-makers and practitioners identify policies and programs that improve the well-being of all people in Canada, with a special concern for the effects on those facing disadvantage, and to raise the standards of evidence that are used in assessing these policies

Power of Story with Carol Rowan

What do stories do? Why do stories matter? How do we, as early childhood educators and pedagogues live and work with stories? Who shares stories with you? With whom do you share stories? Why do we share stories? In this Keynote I will share stories about storying in early childhood practice. I want to speak and think with you about stories as method, and stories as pedagogy. I'd like to tell stories about power through story. Stories come in an abundance of shapes and forms, with a myriad of purposes and potentials and powers.

I will suggest that one thing stories can do, is provide the marrow for practices in early childhood education that know about histories and engage in presences. Practices which position us to recognize and cherish and question our lived experiences. Practices which are: ethical, political, complex, curious, and concerned about our common world.



Carol Rowan is a part-time faculty in the Child Studies Unit, of the Department of Education, at Concordia University in Montreal, Quebec. She is also an educational consultant who works with organizations and governments creating curriculum and designing policy, usually related to early childhood education in Inuit and sometimes First Nations and Métis communities and urban populations too. She has been listening to stories, since before she can remember. Over the past twenty years, Carol has been working with Elders and educators to collect and share local stories in community languages, to support pedagogy oriented to local Indigenous values, knowledges and ways.

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Let's Talk About Touching (LTAT) (Pilot Program)

ECEBC is pleased to offer the revised Let's Talk About Touching (LTAT) workshop for teacher training. This is an exciting opportunity for you to be engaged in the re-development of this program.

LTAT is an inclusive child abuse prevention program for children and has been a valuable resource for Early Childhood Educators and teachers. After much research and feedback ECEBC has updated this longstanding program to reflect current language and early years practices. ECEBC is running this as a pilot program as we use the input of participants to further develop this program.

This updated 3rd edition of the LTAT Teacher Training workshop is a total of 15 hours over the course of two days and prepares certified ECEs and teachers to engage with the LTAT program with children in their programs. The workshop is broken down into four modules.

Module 1: provides an overview of the LTAT program and defines child abuse.

Module 2: focuses on the educator's legal responsibilities when a child discloses abuse, and how to make a report and overcome barriers when making a report.

Modules 3 and 4: provide an overview of the LTAT program and kit, and how to deliver the LTAT program with children in your centre.

Each LTAT kit includes a program manual with nine lessons, family resource materials, teaching pictures, felt board figures, sorting cards, puppets, teaching dolls, and other resources.

The subsidized cost of this training has been made available through the Government of BC, Professional Development Fund.

Practices in early childhood and education settings have shifted and a key learning for all educators working with any age group is, compliance is not the goal. Re-Generation: Radical De-Centring of Dominant Voices in Collective Early Childhood Community Work

Waterloo Region's Early Learning and Literacy Alliance (ella) comprises local member organizations working cross-sectorally to create conditions for foundational early-literacy-related capacity building, acquisition and application of new Science, and development of accessible tools and resources for use across the early childhood landscape. As established stakeholders within oppressive community systems of power, the majority of our member organizations are Eurocentric. In order to disrupt our own collective perpetuation of inequity in the early childhood sector, radical leadership was required to de-centre the voices of our member organizations by intersecting our early childhood work with alternative ways of learning, knowing, being, and leading. This interrogation of our relationship to power and knowledge included facilitating a region-wide two-day equity-focused virtual event and created a platform for community voices typically marginalized, combined lived and learned expertise, and established a strong cross-disciplinary network of relationships between scientists, practitioners, and advocates.

In this workshop, you will hear about two programs working to support early childhood educators in BC and Ontario. We will explore the many synergies between the two projects, the learnings along the way, and the value that these programs have had for educators. The two programs are unique, but both focus on building and supporting communities within the ECE workforce. The Association of Early Childhood Educators of Ontario supports regional and relational communities of practice across the province, and has created a new professional learning program - both spaces centred on relationships of care, support, and personal and professional capacity building. The Peer Mentoring Program, a partnership between Thompson Rivers University and ECEBC, aims to support the ongoing professional development needs of beginning and experienced early childhood educators, while expanding the current infrastructure of support for educators, through the creation of 25 Peer Mentoring Communities of Practice across British Columbia. These are spaces for belonging, reflection, and inquiry. We will share stories from each program and discuss together how these structures help to provide space and time for early childhood educators to come together in care, connection, and advocacy. We will explore how strong relationships and meaningful, supportive professional learning can be centered in our own ECE communities, as we seek to empower and engage educators and redefine our practice together.


